Irene Gruver Hall passed away 18 September 2023 at home in Montpelier, Idaho. She was born 10 May 1941 in Princeton, Minnesota, to Ralph E. and Theresa M. Jewell Gruver, the eldest of five children. She grew up in Two Harbors, Minnesota, where she graduated from high school. She went to college at Old Dominion University, Norfolk, Virginia; Montana School of Mines, Butte, Montana; and Utah State University, Logan, Utah.

On 13 May 1974, Irene married Leonard Frazier Hall and she is survived by him. They were together for 49 years. She had one daughter, Chris, and two grandchildren. Leonard has three children, thirteen grandchildren, and four great-grandchildren.

Irene lived in many places during her lifetime, including California, Tennessee, Florida, Colorado, Montana, Mississippi, Minnesota, Wisconsin, New Mexico, Utah, Cuba, and Idaho. In 2004 she and Leonard moved to Montpelier, Idaho.

(7) Demonstrated chair caning at Utah's Festival of the American West/Great West Fair from 1982 to 1994, and 2005. (8) Certified as a Computer Numerical Control (CNC) metal lathe operator. (9) Won first prizes for beet pickles, salsa, wine, pear butter, and peanut brittle at the Bear Lake County Fair. (10) Ran a B&B which she owned with her husband in Minnesota.





Susan was born on August 19, 1946, to Lloyd and Irene Richards Hopkins in Ontario, Oregon, which is just across the Idaho border at Payette. She had two brothers, which made her the favorite daughter. They are both deceased.

In addition to Montpelier, Susi has also lived in Boise and Pocatello. She attended ISU to become a nurse.

Susi likes to crochet, read, camp and volunteer. She played several musical instruments. She also enjoyed watching her son at the snowmobiling races. She is the librarian at her church.

She met her husband, Kyle, when she had a roommate from Montpelier who invited her to come here for a weekend. Kyle asked her to marry him the day after they met, but they waited

3½ years because she was in college and the Army. She moved here in 1967.

Kyle and Susi have 3 children, 10 grandchildren, and 9 great grandchildren. All live around here, but one, who is in Kansas.

Susan joined the Bear Lake Memorial Hospital Auxiliary in 2013 and served as their secretary for several years. She volunteered at the Sunshine Corner, Thrift Store, Snowball dance, and would do anything that was asked of her. Kyle belonged to the Lions Club, and she helped him with various things there. Susi also belonged to the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Her greatest accomplishments include raising a family and always being there for them. She made sure they always had a family day once a week. She held three jobs at one time to support them when Kyle was hurt in an accident at Simplot. She has also worked at the Skilled Nursing Facilities in Montpelier and Soda Springs. She is a veteran, having served in the Army from 1964 to 1967. She was stationed on a ship off the coast of Vietnam, where they took care of casualties from that war.

Susan passed away peacefully, surrounded by her family on February 10, 2024. Services were held Saturday, February 24, at 11:00 am at the 1st/4th ward chapel.

Tribute to Bernice Parslow



Bernice was born in Brigham City, Utah, the youngest of five children and was referred to as "Daddy's girl."

She met her husband, Bill, through a friend. Bill was working on a construction job in Ogden when he met Bernice, who was 16 years old. They dated for five months and then Bill joined the Air Force when his construction job ran out. After five months of basic training in Texas, he returned to Ogden and Bernice was still his sweetheart. They were married one month after Bernice turned 17. Three days after the wedding, Bill left for Adana, Turkey, for an 18-month tour of duty. When he came home, they picked up where they left off: honeymooning in Tucson, Arizona, with a 9-month-old son. They were there for two years and nine months.

When Bill was discharged from the Air Force in November 1964, they moved to Geneva and started farming. Bernice helped with

many of the chores.

Bernice and Bill had 8 children, 24 grandchildren and 19 great grandchildren. Their names all start with a "B," and she proudly named her home "the B-Hive." They are a close-knit family and got together for reunions and many other occasions.

Bernice was a kind, caring, and giving person who always put the needs of her family before her own. She was a strong woman who faced every challenge in her life with courage and determination. She was a woman of great faith, and instilled in her children the importance of family, hard work, and doing what is right. She worked in various jobs to help support the family, including working several years as a CNA at Bear Lake Memorial Hospital Skilled Nursing Facility. She volunteered many hours of service to her church, The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, and to the Bear Lake community, including spending many hours supporting the Bear Lake Hospital Auxiliary.

She joined our Auxiliary in 2004 and served as second vice-president, first vice-president and two terms as president. She put in many hours at the Thrift Store. She and Bill were King and Queen of the Snowball dance in 2012. In addition, she belonged to the Sharp Shooters Camera Club and Geneva's Pollyanna Club. She sang, played the piano, and was Primary pianist in her church for many years. She also liked to read, camp, and go out to dinner and movies with friends. She collected teddy bears, bird houses, and Christmas villages.

Bernice entered the Bear Lake Memorial Hospital Skilled Nursing Facility in 2017 and passed away on January 3, 2024, at the age of 80. Bernice was a source of inspiration to her family, and she will be deeply missed by everyone whose lives she touched.
